

Activity 1: Engagement and questioning – Pictorial maps

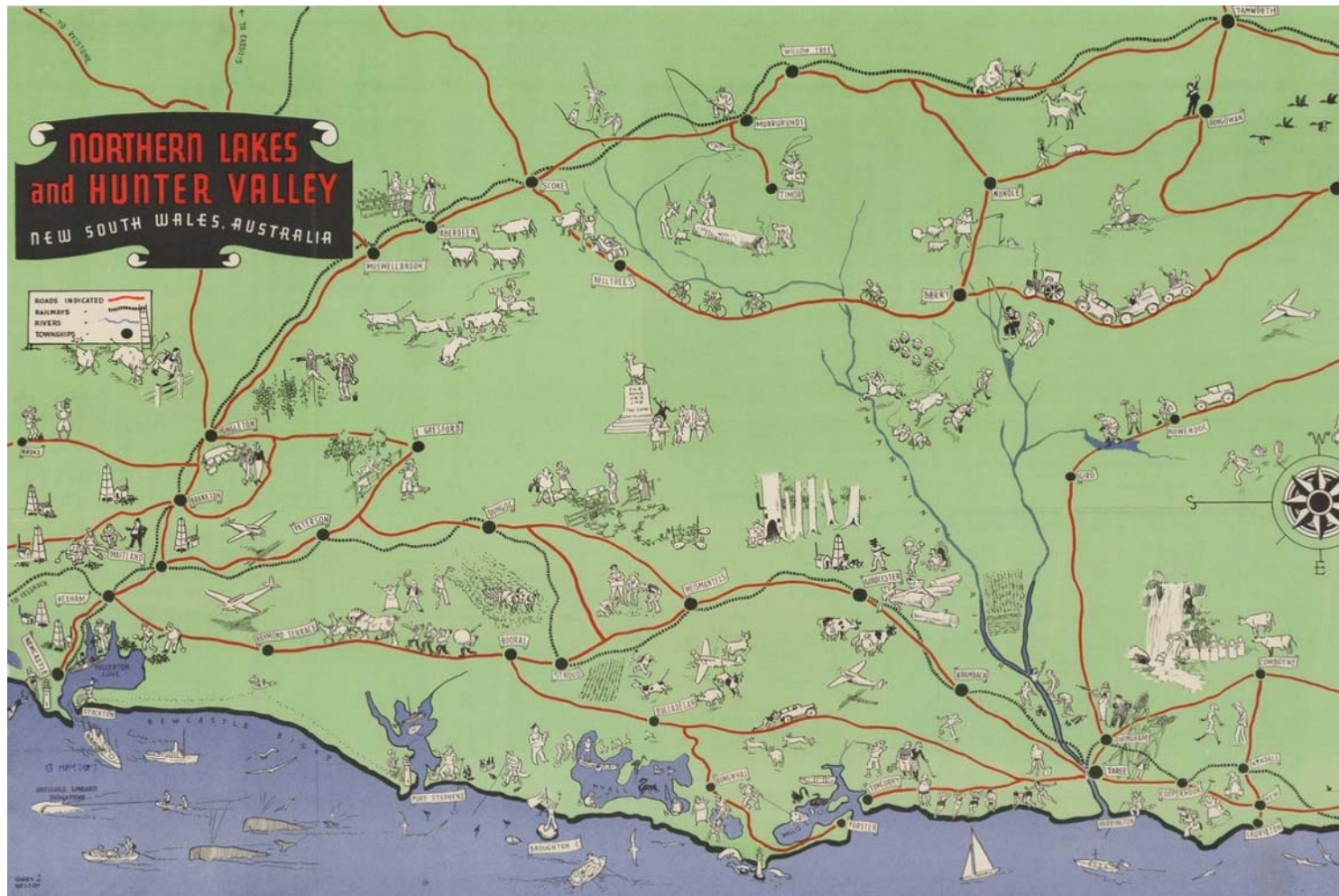

Formulate questions for the inquiry:

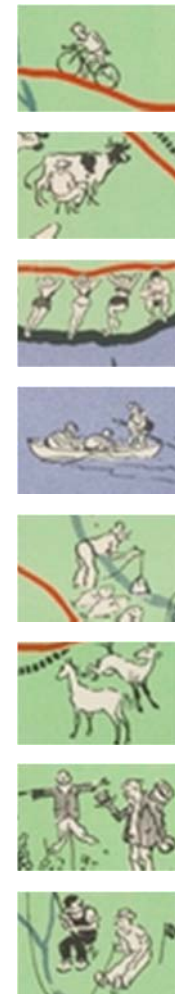
How can location be represented?
