



## *Legal issues for older people*

<p><b>Adult children living at home</b></p> <p>Explains what you can do if you are an older person who is sharing your home with an adult child, and you want them to leave.</p>		<p><b>Are you a grandparent? Your legal questions answered</b></p> <p>Explains what legal options you have if you are a grandparent who is raising grandchildren, denied contact with grandchildren or if you are concerned about your grandchildren's welfare.</p>	
	<p><b>Are you experiencing violence or abuse? You can make it stop</b></p> <p>Explains what you can do if you are an older person who is experiencing violence or abuse from a partner, another family member or other person.</p>		<p><b>Helping your family financially? Understand the risks</b></p> <p>Explains what you need to think about before you decide to lend money to a family member.</p>
<p><b>Moving in with the family? Make sure you protect your interests</b></p> <p>Explains what you should think about before you enter into a 'granny flat arrangement'.</p>		<p><b>They want me to leave</b></p> <p>Explains what you can do to avoid losing your home after your partner dies.</p>

 <p><b>LawAccess NSW</b></p> <p>Free government telephone service that provides legal information, referrals and advice for people who have a legal problem in NSW.</p>	 <p><b>Seniors Rights Service</b></p> <p>Provides advice to older people on human rights, planning for the future, consumer rights, accommodation matters and other issues.</p>	 <p><b>Ageing and Disability Abuse Helpline</b></p> <p>Report concerns about abuse, neglect or exploitation of older people and adults with disability.</p>	 <p><b>Community Legal Centres NSW</b></p> <p>The Community Legal Centres NSW Recommendation Service app directs you to community legal centres that are suitable for your situation.</p>
